The Oceanview Mine of San Diego County

Jeff Swanger, CEO Oceanview Mines, LLC

Jeff is CEO of Oceanview Mines, LLC and owner of the Oceanview, Pala Chief and Elizabeth R mines on Chief Mountain. Jeff has had an interest in pegmatites and mining since he was a boy growing up in nearby Escondido, CA. That interest developed into a passion, and Jeff has been mining in his spare time since he was in his teens. Now he's living his dream of discovering the next great gem pocket in the Pala Mining District.

His 60-acre property is surrounded by the Pala Indian Reservation, but the mining claims predate 1903 when the tribe was forced onto the land, so the mineral rights were grandfathered in.

In the past 15 years, Swanger and crew of professional miners have dug about two miles of zigzagging tunnels beneath his land, some as deep as 1,000 feet, following veins of pegmatite in which all sorts of riches can be found, like tourmalines, kunzites, morganites!

AN OLD GEOLOGIST'S TALES

As many of you know, Gene Ciancanelli is a long-standing member of the PGMC. Gene had a long career as an exploration geologist searching for energy and mineral resources throughout North America and Asia. These Old Geologist's Tales are excerpts from a book Gene wrote for the Huntington Library's archive

ONE BRIGHT-EYED GEOLOGIST (Part 4)

THE WONDERFUL CHRISTMAS GIFT

In the 1960's, I'm exploring for porphyry copper deposits for Phelps Dodge Corporation. Part of the time, I'm using a helicopter rather than a jeep. The pilot is Bob Murray, a World War II bomber pilot, who was one of the world's first helicopter pilots. Bob had an Irish father and an Italian mother, so he grew up eating Italian food, except when he visited his Irish grandmother and as Bob put it, **"I ate boiled things".** After working all day, we eat well on


the expense account, but things are different in the field. We leave the motel in the dark to begin working at first light. There are no places open to buy a lunch; so instead we keep a box full of canned food "delicacies" in the helicopter. In the 1960's, there are very few canned lunch foods available. The lunch menu offers sardines, canned boned chicken, little canned "Vienna" sausages, canned potted meat (we call dog food), smoked oysters, canned fruit, and crackers. We're eating this same unappetizing selection day in and day out.

There is a fallacy that corporations do preplanning to insure the utmost efficiency. Having worked as a geologist for over 100 companies, I know from experience that companies rarely plan anything and when they do it is a complete screw-up (actually men never use the word "screw-up"). Inevitably, Phelps Dodge has us working in southern Arizona's low deserts to bask in 115-degree summer heat. When winter arrives, we're sent to the highest mountain peaks to enjoy the snow, alpine vistas, and 15-degree temperatures. Thus we enjoy hot lunches in summer and cold lunches in winter.

In December we're working in snow high in a mountain range. At lunchtime, Bob is shivering in the helicopter and I know he has developed a real dislike for the greasy slimy boned chicken entree. Even today, 50 years on, my stomach churns at the thought of canned boned chicken. So naturally, (Gene) "Hey Bob how about a nice boned chicken lunch?" (Bob) "No not another can of that \$#%&!*\$^# boned chicken. That stuff is worse than the Spam the army poisoned us with. Why are you freezing my butt off and feeding me boned chicken? I thought we were friends. Why are we working up here anyway?" (Gene) "Bob the company said you need more practice landing in snow!" (Bob) "@&>!#*#\$!% give me F#\$%ing sardines."

We finish work about a week before Christmas ... there is a Santa Claus. Phelps Dodge made me work the previous Christmas, but I outsmarted them this year and they won't know I've returned home until after Christmas. My Jeep is in Bob's hanger in Phoenix; so we fly back together. Leaving the airport to return home to Douglas Arizona, it occurs to me that I should give Bob a Christmas present and suddenly, in a flash of inspiration, I know the perfect gift. The large family size can of boned chicken is purchased at a nearby supermarket. In the 1960's, Goldwater's Department Store is Arizona's premier high society department store. Goldwater's has a gift-wrapping department that will gift wrap and deliver anything for a price, regardless of where it is purchased. The Goldwater gifts are not delivered in an ordinary truck, but instead are delivered by a white-gloved Chauffer in a limousine, very posh. At Goldwater's, I hand Bob's gift to the impeccably dressed older snobbish lady in the gift-wrapping department. She says, **"Sir this is a can of boned chicken!" "I known that, I want it gift wrapped".** She gives me a condescending look that implies I'm a rube bumpkin and mumbles several comments as I stand there in my dirty field clothes and ask, **"What is the finest wrapping?"** With an exasperated expression she points to several samples and I select the blue foil wrapping with a big white lace bow and a Holly berry sprig. She places the big can in a box lined with tissue and begins wrapping

as I fill out the gift card, which has the name Goldwater Department Store embossed in gold. I write, "Bob, a small token of our appreciation for all your hard work and dedicated service to the corporation over this very successful year". The card is signed, Walter Lawson (the big cheese of Phelps Dodge Corporation).

The doorbell rings and Bob's wife, Violet, answers the door surprised to see a white-gloved Chauffer, who hands her a beautiful blue foil wrapped box with lace ribbon. Violet places the box under the tree and for days the family wonders what marvelous gift is inside the Christmas present Phelps Dodge sent from Goldwater's. On Christmas morning the blue mystery box is the first package the Murray family opens. Early on Christmas day, our phone rings and I answer by saying, "Merry Christmas Bob." Immediately, he replies, "You Son-Of-A-Gun, (*He used another word instead of "Gun"*) you really got me with that one. For days now, Violet, the kids, and I have been anticipating opening the beautiful present from Phelps Dodge. This morning it was the first package we opened and there sat that damn can of boned chicken." (Gene) "Bob I just wanted your family to enjoy a nice boned chicken dinner for the holiday. Tell Violet to warm it to 115 degrees and serve it right from the can just like you enjoy it."

Bob later got even with the turkey incident. We had been working up near Jerome, Arizona. The project completed, we are flying back to Phoenix. It is a hot late spring day and to keep cool we are flying about 8,000 feet above the ground with the helicopter's doors off. Suddenly, and without warning, the helicopter banks hard right and goes into a power dive. The helicopter engine is screaming and I have a death grip on the seat, because the seat belt is the only thing preventing me from falling straight down and out of the helicopter, which is plunging rapidly toward the ground. Bob hasn't uttered a word, which I take as a bad sign. At the last minute, with the Angel of Death staring me in the face, he pulls the helicopter up and we are cruising along about 150 feet off the ground as if nothing has happened. (Gene) "WHAT THE HELL HAPPENED?" (Bob) "Turkeys". (Gene) "We almost hit a flock of turkeys?" Then my brain tells me turkeys don't fly at 8,000 feet. (Gene) "Turkeys don't fly at 8,000 feet." (Bob) "I know that." (Gene) "Why did you say we almost hit a flock of turkeys?" (Bob) "We weren't going to hit turkeys. We almost flew over a turkey ranch. Turkeys are stupid and they see a helicopter and think it is some giant bird coming to eat them. They panic and many drop dead. I flew over a turkey ranch last year and a judge made me buy \$3,000 of dead turkeys. I'm not buying anymore dead turkeys!" (Gene) "Thanks for sharing that bit of helicopter wisdom. Now there is a stain to clean off the helicopter seat." (Bob) "You damn Guinea, did you mess up my helicopter?" When we landed in Phoenix, Bob offered to buy me a turkey dinner, but I had no more appetite for turkey than he had for canned boned chicken.

CERTIFICATE OF AMENDMENT

OF

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE PALOMAR GEM AND MINERAL CLUB

The undersigned certify that:

1. They are the president and the secretary, respectively, of The Palomar Gem and Mineral Club, a California corporation.

2. The paragraph designated as "II)" and which currently states: "The purpose for which said corporation is formed is to promote interest in the earth science in all their branches." is hereby amended by replacing the entirety of the current paragraph designated as "II)" with the following:

II) The specific purpose of this corporation is to promote interest, engage, educate and mentor the public in lapidary and earth sciences in all of its branches.

3. The paragraph designated as "III)" and which currently states: "This said corporation is organized pursuant to the General Nonprofit Corporation Law, or pursuant to Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 1 of the Corporations Code of the State of California." is hereby amended by replacing the entirety of the current paragraph designated as "III)" with the following:

III) This corporation is a nonprofit Mutual Benefit Corporation organized under the Nonprofit Mutual Benefit Corporation Law. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall benefit, or be distributable to its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance described under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

4. A new and additional paragraph is hereby added to the Articles Of Incorporation immediately after the paragraph designated as "VI)" as follows:

VII) No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not

permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code, or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code.

5. A new and additional paragraph is hereby added to the Articles Of Incorporation immediately after the new paragraph designated as "VII)" as follows:

VIII) Upon the dissolution of the corporation, assets shall be distributed to The California Federation of Mineralogical Societies and no part of the net income or assets of this corporation shall ever inure to the benefit of any director, officer, or member thereof, or to the benefit of any private individual.

6. The foregoing amendment of Articles of Incorporation has been duly approved by the board of directors.

7. The foregoing amendment of Articles of Incorporation has been duly approved by the required vote of the members.

We further declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the matters set forth in this certificate are true and correct of our own knowledge.
